

SDNP LOCAL PLAN REVIEW





Crescent) was designated as having 'potential'. This means it will be seriously considered for inclusion in the final Local Plan. The others were either 'rejected' (meaning they had been visited and assessed) or 'excluded' (meaning that, for planning reasons they were dismissed and neither visited nor assessed). Unless representations are persuasive, these 'rejected' and 'excluded' sites would not be given further consideration.

SDNP asked BPC to respond to its Draft Local Plan by the deadline of the 17th of March 2025. It examined all six sites and agreed with the initial assessment of four of them but resolved to look in more detail at two and decided to make representations on both. The first, CH003 (Land to the east of Coombe Crescent) because it has been designated as having 'potential' - a designation that BPC has a responsibility to evaluate. The second, CH192 (Bury Manor Farm) because it has come to light that it was wrongly assessed in the draft local plan and, in the interests of fairness, ought to be properly reviewed.

COMMUNITY LAND TRUST (CLT) -

A small group of Parish Councillors have formed a steering group to investigate how Bury Parish might benefit from forming it's own CLT with regard to the affordable element of any future housing development. We will update you when we have news.

PUBLIC RIGHTS OF WAY (PROW) -

BPC is working with SDNP, WSCC and local landowners to promote upgraded accessibility to the PRoW within the Parish. In addition to the new footway within the Recreation ground (RG), the roadside footway north of the RG has now been repaired and cleared of vegetation. We hope to make some further announcements soon.





COLDWALTHAM, HARDHAM & WATERSFIELD PARISH NOTES





Bury PC and Coldwaltham PC have now both submitted Traffic Reduction schemes for the two sections of the A29 between Bury Hill and Pulborough. Bury seemed to be further ahead, but their proposals are now out for public consultation, and Coldwaltham's proposals are out for a 'feasibility study' over the summer months. One might be forgiven for asking why, in the face of extremely complex and comprehensive submissions from both Bury and Coldwaltham, there is now another extensive round of inquiries, that further delay the expected outcomes, across another summer of speeding road users and dangerous driving. We seek to support WSCC Highways in whatever way we can, but such extended timeframes try our patience, and often lead to public disillusion. We would like to resurrect our Speedwatch group, so please get in touch if interested.

It is hoped that, on a meeting that has now taken place on 19th March with the CEO of the Post Office, our proposals for a balanced and equable support of our local PO have been listened to attentively. You will have read the previous Link, where we set out the impact on the local "Precept" for 2025/2026, and since then we have circulated details of how we would like to promote the fundraising campaign to support the PO over the coming year(s). At this stage, at time of writing, we are assuming that we must raise, at least, £5000 to support our current offer. If events go in our favour, and the PO agrees to further funding, then monies raised will allow us to extend coverage into the future. You can find a copy of the "flyer" elsewhere in this Link (Page 13), and there is also a copy on the Coldwaltham Facebook Page. There is even a "jar" on the counter at the PO for contributions – so, large or small, it all helps – so please help this cause.

The South Downs National Park has been consulting over the winter about land and building development within the Park. The work has now started on the small development at the foot of the Lodge Hill land. The SDNP still has the land to the South/East of Brookview listed as a potential development site. Coldwaltham PC has made a set of observations about this possible development, not least concerning the loss of yet more 'green space'. However, we do need more mixed housing in the Parish. It is noteworthy that the SDNP has now identified a third category of housing, namely, designated as "first-time buyer" possible. This would certainly give greater support to a range of locally based generations. Such new housing is important to support the existence of the School. The proposed creation of a village shop is a significant step, and would help reduce car journeys to Pulborough, for many items that 'we cannot do without'!

All is not perfect however, and the access to such land is currently proposed as being direct from the A29. This would further impact on some of the traffic issues, as noted above, so we would expect WSCC Highways to have views on this. The proximity to both waterworks and protected habitats is also noted as priority for consideration.

The first Bank Holiday weekend of May will be a significant anniversary date for many people, as VE (Victory in Europe) Day is celebrated. It is hoped that we can all celebrate this in whatever way we can, to mark 80 years of peace, and anticipate peace will continue in Europe.

CHICHESTER DISTRICT COUNCIL

Last month I gave a brief update of the fast-moving Devolution and
Local Government Reorganisation work that the Government has demanded of
Tier 1 (County) and Tier 2 (District Council) of local government. I make no apology
for continuing the conversation, as very little appears in the national news and press
about this issue. Yet this is the most fundamental change to local government since
the early 1970s and will affect us all.

A week after the Governments own deadline, we finally heard that Sussex (East and West Sussex and Brighton and Hove) are included in the nine chosen fast track candidates, moving to a Strategic Board with elected Mayor by 2028. Whether we like it or not all counties and local authorities will have to go down this route, the advantage of being in the first tranche is that there is funding to help in the transition.

Being in the fast track for the Strategic Board, means that district councillors will automatically be fast tracked into unitary authorities. As I said last month these unitary authorities should have at least a population of 500K. Chichester has roughly a population of 125,000 so we will have to merge with three or even four other district councils. So, conversations between the district councils are now commencing and we have a little over five weeks to conclude. This conversation cannot be finalised because there remain many questions that the government need to address. Hopefully, in the next week we will have the answer to those questions, and we can proceed.

The government in the wake of the announcement, that we are in the fast-track group, also postponed the May 2025 County Council elections. In law you can only postpone elections a year at a time, but if the elections are going to be cancelled this year, then they will probably be postponed in 2026 and in 2027. County Councillors are elected for four years, and its likely their elections will be postponed by three years. District Council elections that are due in 2027 are also likely to be postpone for a year, as district councils will become Unitary Authorities a year later. Needless to say, the governments postponement of the County Council elections for potentially three years has been called anti-democratic. This time next month we shall know what our Unitary Authority will look like.

At the moment, POL cover the staffing costs of just two of our six hours of opening each week, with the balance of the costs falling to the community. We are grateful to our MP for arranging a meeting at the House of Commons with acting Post Office CEO, Neil Brocklehurst, on 24 March. Our pitch? The POL has called for innovation and new thinking to maintain the network but when a community like ours demonstrates just that, we are pushed back into the existing 'outreach model' of just two hours a week – far too limiting for a busy venue like ours. We hope to persuade POL that they should pay for one day a week while the community pays for the second, developing a model of true partnership working between communities and POL: "the Coldwaltham Model". Watch this space.



SEEING THE DOWNS: LATER WORKS OF PETER IDEN ART EXHIBITION


The artist, Peter Iden was the most inventive recent interpreter of the South Downs – the landscape that surrounded him throughout his life (1945-2012).

On various dates between the 6th and 15th May, Champs Hill will present an exhibition of 40 of Peter Iden's late paintings, none of which have been shown since the major retrospective of his work at the Otter Gallery, University of Chichester, in 2013. 'Seeing the Downs' offers a rare opportunity to revisit Peter's striking abstracted landscapes.

This body of work demonstrates immersion in, commitment to and intimate conversation with Peter's native Sussex landscape. Peter the visionary invites us to journey with him – Amberley, Goodwood, the Arun, Didling Church, Halnaker Hill – both mapping and sensing the terrain.

Peter Iden held over 30 one-man exhibitions in Sussex and elsewhere. He was one of a very small number of artists who managed to make a living entirely from their painting; he had no agent, received no grants, and never did any teaching. Although Peter's work has been shown in venues such as Pallant House, the Royal Academy and Messum's, he never received the recognition in his own lifetime that this remarkable body of work deserves. Sussex people know this and many still hold a residual love for these paintings. The estate of Peter Iden has retained a significant number of the greatest of the late paintings and thanks to Mary Iden, Champs Hill is able to open up the collection for this exhibition in May.

These works really do stand up. We are invited to rub our eyes and to see and feel the Downs again.



BURY GARDENING CLUB

I am writing this in good, warm sunshine and this could easily give us a bit of a false sense of security, as we can easily get more cold, frosty weather, please don't get too advanced and put out those tender plants early, or at any rate be prepared to put them away again quickly.



April and May are both busy months in the garden. Our garden is based on clay, in spite of being so close to the Downs, and this means that we get a lot of moss in our lawns. So April will start with a few sessions of moss removal – watering with Sulphite of Iron and scarifying, before giving the lawns an overall feed. Also I will be pricking out very many flower and vegetable seedlings, which were sown in March, in order to prepare them for the May Plant Sale. Also as the weather generally warms up, it will be very important to keep a close eye on any Box Bushes you may have; the caterpillar will soon start to get active, so be ready to pick them off, or deal with them in some other manner. Also you could consider getting out and cleaning any garden furniture, in the hope that you will be able to spend time outside, admiring the work you have done in the garden, as all the plants begin to grow and flower. We will be going around the garden to check that we have done all the necessary pruning, especially on the Hydrangeas, and splitting any herbaceous plants that have got too large for their allotted area.

In the vegetable garden we will be starting to sow various root crops, like carrots and parsnips, but please remember that they do not like too rich a soil, so avoid any area you may have covered with compost.

As May comes along and we find that there is not so much to do, except mow the grass and caste your eyes around all the beds to check on any weed growth, have a thought for all the good pollinating insects and if you have the necessary space, ensure that at least a small area of the garden is allowed to grow wild. Also carefully check any bird feeders, you may have. The young fledglings will need extra food to grow, but please keep all those feeders clean and give them frequent good washes to remove any viruses that might linger.

Looking forward to a pleasant Spring and good gardening. Don't forget the May Plant Sale and Coffee Morning in Bury Village Hall on Saturday 3rd May.

The theme of understanding about other cultures is one of the two themes that has shone through this term. BURY A29 ROAD IMPROVEMENT COMMITTEE

In the last edition of The Link we provided a progress report on moves to tackle the long-standing problem of dangerous and noisy antisocial driving on the A29 through the village.



The County Council recently launched its formal statutory consultation process regarding the proposed reduction in speed limit from 50 mph to 40 mph for which we have been campaigning for a number of years. When implemented this will apply "from a point 100m south of Field House, southwards to a point 125m south of the South Downs Way trail, a distance of 3.5km".

This was also publicised in the Bury Parish Council weekly email newsletter on 26th of February and we hope you may have been able to respond in support of the proposals.

The **A29RIC** submitted its response, supporting "unequivocally the County Council's proposal to introduce a permanent Order which will be extend the 40mph speed limit on the A29 southwards through Bury Village and Bury Hill".

We have also urged the authorities to install Average Speed Cameras along the length of the carriageway to which the new limit will apply, and have also emphasised the need for the proposed speed limit to be implemented before the busy summer season commences.

The Committee is working in the background on further proposed measures including:

- Landscaping schemes to emphasise the local community environs of the A29 within the parish
- Additional speed indicator devices
- Establishing a Community Speedwatch group
- · Village gates
- Seasonal roadside poster campaigns and more

We hope that as many residents as possible will join us at the **Annual Parish meeting on 28th April**, as part of which we will be giving an update on progress.

This will give an opportunity for you to ask any questions, make any suggestions, and for us to give more detail on future plans, all of which are designed to provide a safer, more peaceful and healthier environment for our parish community.

Preparations for a Wedding Bells and Bats Included!

I'm a bellringer and live a mere 500yds from St Giles Church, Coldwaltham, built around c1200. In September I was asked by my good neighbour and church warden, "Could I find ringers for a wedding in December?"

St Giles has three bells. The two lighter ones were installed in around 1390, but the tenor is engraved with "1665 Pr (pastor)Thomas Hunter. Church Warden John Hale". 1665 was the year of the plague. Did they pay for the bell, or perhaps an acknowledgement for their work during that dreadful year? The St Giles bells are three Chiming Bells! A bit of a different style of ringing, plenty of time to practice before December. Well, I have never rung Chiming bells and although the ropes were reinstated 10 years or so ago, no one in the village rings them either. Doves says they are un-ringable, no stays or sliders, but they will chime. Why are they un-ringable? I get advice from a number of towers captains and bell repairers and make a plan to have the bells checked.



Meanwhile back in the church, the warden also has problems with bats. I seek advice from a bat rescuer, she can't help but suggests contacting "Bats in Churches"! An email is fired off and all goes very quiet until a phone call "can we come and inspect for bats this afternoon?" The ecologists find around 20 bats in the church. One of the bats could be a rare Grey Long Eared Bat, last recorded in Petworth two years ago. We are awaiting results from the poo to verify the Grey.

Meanwhile I muster a group of willing ringers and we set about practice sessions. The ropes are a bit moth eaten and giants must have rung them in the past. The loan of box risers are required for practice sessions. The treble is a bit moody, one of the band offers to oil the clappers, canons and headstocks. Easier said than done. The fixed, vertical 20ft ladder is only the first challenge, the safety harness as much a challenge as the ladder! In the bell chamber there is an addition extendable ladder for another 12 ft climb to access the bells and frame (amid years of bat poo). But canons and clappers are greased!

Back to the wedding, a plan has been agreed with the ringers as to what sounds best and how to make a break should we need to change ringers. Each chime needs arm muscles to keep the swing and rhythm, the bell doesn't maintain it's momentum as it doesn't swing high enough, unlike conventional ringing. Remember no stays and no sliders so we don't dare ring high. We also found "Changes" a challenge, so just plain ringing is planned, stopping two out of three bells occasionally to change the order of bells and possibly ringers if need be!



This project has been very interesting, widening our local history and ecology knowledge, maybe putting St Giles, Coldwaltham on the "chiming" map.

My thanks to the church warden, various tower captains, Chris from Bridport, Bats in Churches, my ringing colleagues, those who took photos and lastly to the bride who requested bells to be rung at her wedding.

FARMING NOTES

At last, the weather has dried up and work on the farm has been very busy. We have managed to get all our spring barley planted in good time, but it now needs a warm rain to bring it on! The variety of barley that we grow is suited to malting for making beer and much of it is exported through Shoreham port and goes over to Holland for use there or onward shipment down the Rhine into Germany.



The wheat that was planted last autumn looks well and is just responding to its first application of fertiliser as it turns a deeper shade of green. The wheat variety is known as a Group three that is specifically suited to biscuit making in this country. However, it is also well suited to making the type of bread that they eat in Spain and, again, that goes through Shoreham port down to Northern Spain for use in their flour mills.

Most sheep farmers will be in full swing lambing now and what wonderful weather for it. Newborn lambs do not like it wet and cold so the recent sunny weather will be welcomed by shepherds. Our cattle are still in the shed because grass growth has not really got going but I guess they will go out in early to mid April to spend the summer at grass before coming in to be finished on silage next winter.

I am not going to dwell on the actions current government because I have covered some of it in earlier pieces and it has been well documented in the national press, but it really seems that they care little about British food and farming and the rural way of life that flows from it. After the inheritance tax bombshell there have been more announcements that contradict everything that they said before the election which will make the economics of producing food even harder than it is now.


